In an effort to get a better understanding of the work to be undertaken by the Kiwa EMPOWER Project in the selected three Pacific Island countries, the various country teams have undertaken comprehensive baseline surveys.

The Baseline Survey allows for an assessment of the existing capacities of local communities regarding Nature based solutions to Climate change (NbS). The Survey will also identify any gaps or areas where additional support is needed. By understanding the local community capacities, the teams will be better tailor its capacity-building efforts to the specific needs of each community,

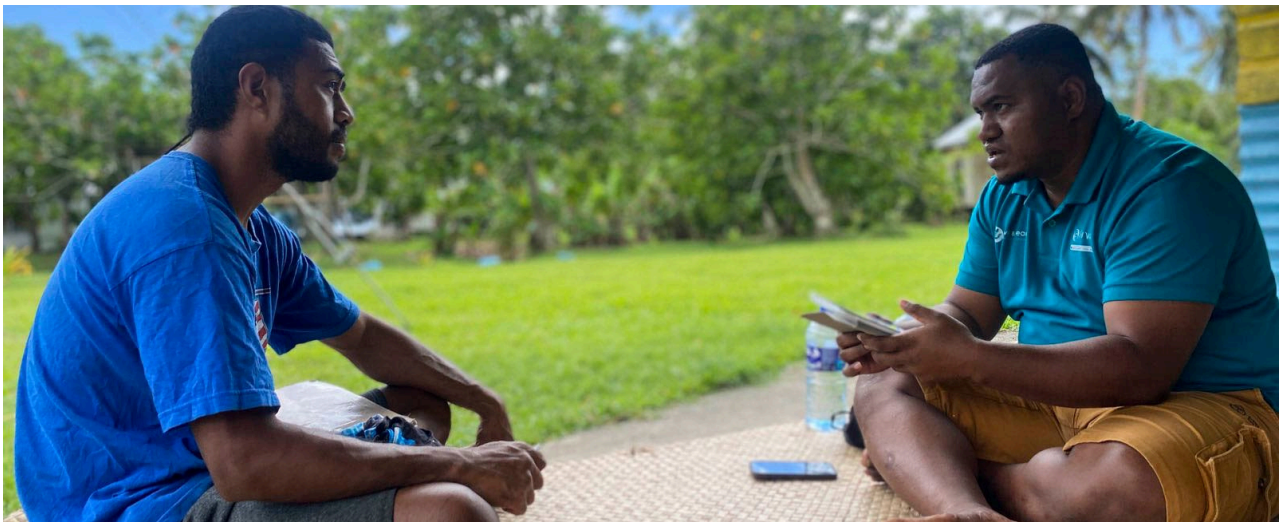

Kris worked closely with the Kiwa EMPOWER teams in Fiji, Solomon Islands and Tuvalu to gather information on GEDSI in the context of NbS intervention, meeting with key stakeholders, including local communities, government agencies, and other relevant organizations. Findings from Kris will then be compiled and used to inform the project's planning and implementation.

A Report will be produced and the finding mainstreamed in planning and implementation of the Kiwa EMPOWER Project.

Fiji Islands update

September - December 2025

A total of twenty communities chosen as part of the Kiwa EMPOWER Project in three Provinces underwent an intensive data collection process.

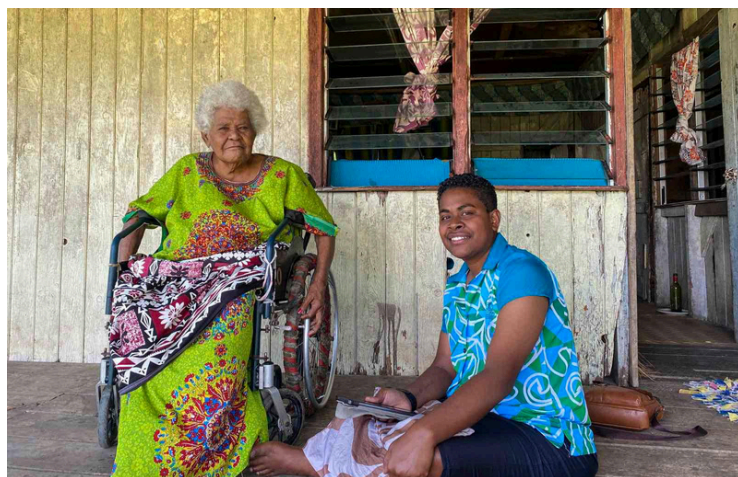
The Baseline Survey took three weeks with the support of other Live and Learn Fiji Project teams.

The main objective of this activity was to gauge the existing capacities of the communities regarding Nature-based Solutions, CEDSI and inclusion within the 20 project sites in Cakaudrove, Bua and Macuata Provinces.

Prior to undertaking the survey, the 12-member team ensured prior consent was given through the presentation of i sevusevu to the District Chief (Turaga Tui Tunuloa), Turaga Ni Yavusa (clan leaders) and Village Headmen. This was a critical element in the trust-building process and culturally sensitive engagement.

Following the baseline survey, data verification and analysis were undertaken. The findings provided an insight into the work which will need to be implemented over the next year.

The final stage of the process included taking the findings of the Survey back to the community to finalise the proposed activities which will be implemented in 2026.

GEDSI Training for Trainers in Fiji

December 2025

An intensive four day training was undertaken as part of the Kia EMPOWER Project to equip staff of Live & Learn Fiji to be GEDSI trainers.

The Training undertaken by the Gender Resilience Officer Joseva Maikitu focused on GEDSI in Nature Based Solutions or NbS.

The training which focused on GEDSI and project implementation, allowed for the participants to better understand Gender Equity, Disability and Social Inclusion (GEDSI) and how their work tie in together. To understand the linkage to 12 key human rights relevant to NbS.

As a result, all participants now understand key GEDSI concepts such as Equity vs. Equality, Social Model of Disability, Intersectionality, utilise practical tools, such as the Risk & Benefit Matrix, to identify and mitigate social risks in NbS projects.

The training also showed how to lead inclusive facilitation and communication techniques for community engagement.

The session also allowed for the participants to design and deliver a segment Community Session Plan.

The training will be replicated in both Tuvalu and Solomon Islands.

Solomon Islands update

October 2025

The Kiwa EMPOWER Project Team in Solomon Islands successfully conducted a three-week Baseline Survey across its two project sites—Sikaiana Community and Nifiloli Community.

The survey exercise was undertaken from 27th to 30th October 2025 in Sikaiana, followed by two weeks of fieldwork in Nifiloli. The Baseline Survey provided the project team with a crucial opportunity to understand the diverse livelihood components such as socio-economic conditions, WASH, Climate-Smart Agriculture, Food and Water Security as well as Disaster Resiliency.

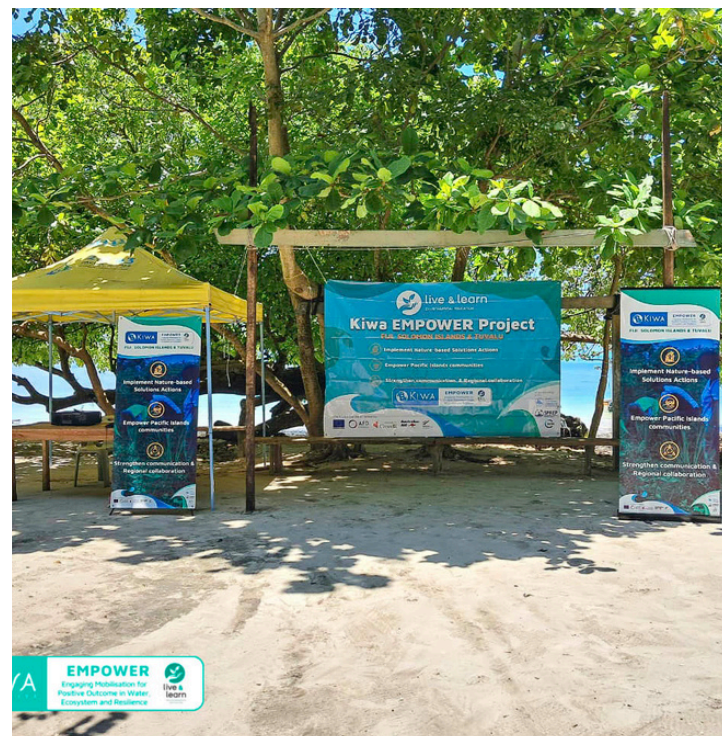
Findings from both communities reveal a consistent and escalating pattern of climate-related vulnerabilities. Households reported increasing impacts from sea-level rise, coastal erosion and inundation, prolonged dry periods, and storm events.

These stressors pose significant threats to food and water security and undermine traditional livelihood systems.

Community food sources are predominantly dependent on marine ecosystems, coconuts, swamp taro (in Sikaiana), bananas and breadfruit in Nifiloli, and imported rice from Honiara. Climate variability has negatively affected local crop production and fish availability, while irregular shipping services further exacerbate food insecurity, increasing reliance on limited and less diverse food sources.

Despite these significant challenges, both Sikaiana and Nifiloli communities demonstrated strong resilience and a high level of willingness to engage with the project. Community members expressed appreciation for external support and optimism about the potential benefits of the planned interventions.

The project team conducted on-site observations which enhanced the team's understanding of the physical, social, and environmental context of the communities and validated findings from the baseline survey.

Tuvalu Update

October - December 2025

The Tuvalu Kiwa EMPOWER team carried out a three week Baseline Survey in four communities to better understand their comprehension of NbS and Inclusion.

During the Baseline Survey, the focus was on assessing the local communities' capacities regarding inclusion, GEDSI, and nature-based solutions under the Kiwa EMPOWER Project.

This assessment took place at 2 island sites and also provided an opportunity to identify the communities' primary needs for fostering long-term engagement with the Kiwa EMPOWER initiative.

The project team obtained prior approval by meeting up with the Kaupule members. The Kaupule is the elected executive body of the local island council, functioning as the local government, managing island services, infrastructure, and resources. It is the practical arm for implementing decisions for their island community, under the Falekaupule Act.

Following the meeting, the team had a separate meeting with the Falekaupule or the traditional Assembly of Elders to raise awareness of the Project and seeking their endorsement.

This is an important step in the Free Prior Informed Consent (FPIC) process. This approach was essential for building trust and demonstrating cultural sensitivity.

Following this, team members were organized into pairs to conduct baseline surveys across 2 islands with each has two settlements.

The initial sessions provided briefings on the Live & Learn Tuvalu (Niutao & Nanumea) initiative and the Kiwa EMPOWER project, detailing their objectives and activities while raising awareness about Nature-based Solutions and the purpose of the Baseline Survey.
